English	Class Teacher	Year 6 English: Gold Rush Persuasive Speaking In this unit, students: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> explore life on the Australian goldfields through a range of historical and literary texts. explore multiple perspectives how persuasive language can influence audiences, and how point of view can shape a message. explain how point of view, precise language choices, persuasive devices, and text structures are used to position an audience and shape meaning. apply this knowledge to create a historical vlog, presenting a persuasive argument (in character) to a colonial authority, advocating for change on an issue faced by their gold rush group (e.g. miners, migrant workers, police). use a variety of persuasive devices, deliberate language choices, and features of voice to enhance their argument, while experimenting with multimodal elements such as visuals, sound, and pacing to strengthen their message. build advanced persuasive speaking skills through reading, viewing, planning, rehearsing, and presenting for authentic and imagined audiences.

Science	Class Teacher	Physical Science – Exploring the Transfer of Light In this unit: Students will investigate the properties of light and the formation of shadows. They will investigate reflection angles, how refraction affects our perceptions of an object's location, how filters absorb light and affect how we perceive the colour of objects, and the relationship between light source distance and shadow height.
